MESSAGE FROM MAYOR NICK KAPPATOS

To the Residents of Runnemede,

Spring is finally here! This was a difficult winter, and I want to thank all the Borough Employees for all their hard work, and a special thanks to the Public Works Department for keeping our roads clear during all the snow/ice storms. Myself, all the members of Council and all our Borough Employees worked very hard the last year to continue the progress of improving all aspects of our community.

Please enjoy this newsletter. Thanks again to Council President Patty Passio and Councilman John Ranieri for putting together this newsletter to inform you of all the progress we have made over the last year.

We received \$250,000 from the DOT for this year's projects to re-pave Shissler Circle, Charles Ave., Phillips Ave., and S. Read Ave; replacing fencing at the Girls Softball Field, New Scoreboards for the Harry Williams Building and two new Police Vehicles. Fire Chief Pat Moriaty and Deputy Chief Fred Loverdi have been working with myself and Council to purchase a replacement for our oldest fire truck 1992 Engine with a new 2019 Fire Engine.

I want to welcome two new Police Officers to our Force, Chris Van Aiken and Eric Speakman. These young men represent the first expansion of our Police Department in years. I want to thank Chief Paul Dailey and Captain Bill Geigleman for the leadership in managing the department in a way that has allowed us to not only to make improvements but to expand. A collaboration of everyone working together for the same goals!

A long-awaited project, the Borough Municipal Building ADA renovations will be completed soon, Borough office hours are now 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday thru Friday. The front Public Parking lot has been completed and the LED Message Board is available for all the Borough Departments and Community Organizations to use to communicate with our residents.

Volz Middle school is sharing both the Girls Softball Field and the RYAA Babe Ruth Field for their middle school softball and baseball practices and home games. It's great that the school has added these sports for our children and myself and all the members of Council are proud to support their effort.

Our business district is steadily improving but our work is never done. I want to welcome The Mile restaurant and bar and AllRisk Property Damage Experts as new businesses in town. They, along with the other new businesses that have recently moved to town, represent a positive message that Runnemede is a desirable community to open a business in. This year we will be finalizing our redevelopment plan and updating many of our ordinances to reflect a business-friendly attitude.

As always it is my honor to be the Mayor of Runnemede; my greatest hope and desire is to lead and support our community as we continue on a path of meaningful and lasting progress.

Council have made strides in reducing the amount of abandoned homes in the community. Due to recent policy changes, the amount of unoccupied homes has been reduced by 50%. When a house is vacant and becomes repossessed by the bank, it must be registered with the Borough. This register is used to keep track of the abandoned homes so the Borough can take action by bringing the homes up to code and back on the market to be sold. What happens to your waste water?


Runnemede has five pump stations throughout the town to service our waste water. All five pump the water to the central CCMUA station behind the public works, also pictured below. Then, it is pumped all the way to Ferry Ave station in Camden. There, the water is treated and returned to safe levels before being released back into the water supply.

Mayor and Council have started an energy audit through the *New Jersey Borough of Public Utilities Energy Saving Improvement Program*. All borough buildings and pump stations will be evaluated for energy efficiency and seek out areas of improvement. We will be receiving majority of the funding for the audit from the State, as well as a large percentage of the cost to replace equipment. We anticipate upgrades to our HVAC systems, lighting, pump stations motors and similar systems.



PLANNING AND ZONING FAQs

Is a permit required for a fence installation? Yes. A zoning permit is required and if the fence is the barrier for a pool, a construction permit is also required. A permit is also required for replacing an existing fence in the same location.

Is a permit required for a swimming pool? Yes. A zoning and construction permit is required for the installation. A permit is also required for a storable pool.

Is a permit required for a shed? Yes. A zoning permit is required for installation of a new shed at a new or existing location. A construction permit is also required for sheds over 100 square feet.

If a single family dwelling is rented, what are the requirements? The owner shall register as a landlord with the Borough of Runnemede. An application shall be submitted for a fire and certificate of continued occupancy inspections. The inspections are required prior to change of ownership or occupant. The same applies for apartments, provided the dwelling has zoning approval for the apartment(s). A fire inspection is only required for a one or two family dwelling.

What is required to open a business? An application shall be submitted for zoning approval and for a certificate of continued occupancy.

If I have a complaint regarding the condition of a property, what department shall I contact? The Code Enforcement Office handles complaints which can be accepted anonymously.

Safe, Homemade Weed-Be-Gone

Natural Mosquito Repellent

One of many natural mosquito repellents:

Cinnamon is more than just a great topper to applesauce or oatmeal. According to a study conducted in Taiwan, cinnamon oil can kill off mosquito eggs. It can also act as a repellent against adult mosquitoes, most notably the Asian tiger mosquito. To make a diluted 1 percent solution, mix 1/4 teaspoon (or 24 drops) of oil for every 4 ounces of water. You can spray the fluid onto your skin or clothing, around your home, and onto upholstery or plants. Be careful when applying cinnamon oil, as a concentrated dose can irritate your skin.

continued progress. There are collection bins at Triton High School, Harry Williams Building, Mary E. Volz Middle School, Kiddie Academy, and the Runnemede Police Station.

RUNNEMEDE S.W.A.T. TEAM

Our Police Department is part of a SWAT (Special Weapons And Tactics) Team, know as the ZONE-5 CIT (CRITICAL INCIDENT TEAM). It is comprised of members of several different Camden County Police Departments. The Zone-5 Team was created after the 1995 killings of two police officers in Haddon Heights. When a gunman was using an assault rifle to shoot at the police. Back then our officers were armed with handguns and a shotgun, which proved to be no match for the assault rifle that this gunman was using. The Zone-5 Swat Team is comprised of highly trained officers from Audubon, Bellmawr, Brooklawn, Mount Ephraim, Haddon Heights, Runnemede, and Magnolia.

Here in Runnemede our SWAT officers are Patrolman Joseph Marchese, and Patrolman Matthew Woollen. Other officers through the years have been on the team, most recently Patrolman Kevin Corcoran. Runnemede Police Department has been carrying the Colt M-4 Police rifle in the patrol cars since 2010. Our Officers must qualify four (4) times each year with these weapons. Along with their qualifications, our

officers also train several times a year on active shooter drills at all the grammar schools. Recently the police department and fire department have joined in training drills together and it has been a big success.

As a result of the recent school tragedies, our police department began a "directed patrol" at all Runnemede Schools. While school is in session police will visit the schools during the day to interact with school staff and students, to make them feel safer and to have a better relationship with our officers. This project was created by Chief Dailey and Captain Geigelman, and has been a huge success with the

school staff and children. The Chief, Captain, along with our L.E.A.D. officers are currently developing a program where parents, teachers, and students can meet with the officers, so they can answer any questions or concerns they may have in dealing with the recent tragedy.

HOW TO PROPERLY DISPOSE OF WORN AMERICAN FLAGS



When an American flag becomes worn, faded, torn or soiled, it should be retired and replaced with a new flag. There are several ways to respectfully dispose of the American flag without showing disgrace. The most common method is burning the flag in a special ceremony. The Runnemede V.F.W. (located at E. 6th Ave behind the Fan Treasures Sports Outlet) features a convenient outdoor drop-box where residents can leave their flags in need of retiring. The V.F.W. will soon announce the date of this year's flag burning ceremony.

NEW "Community Cat" Ordinance for Feral Cats within the Borough of Runnemede

Ordinance #18-03 provides general regulations for the safe and sanitary conditions for cats. Moreover, it permits and regulates Community Cat Colonies within the Borough of Runnemede. Finally, the Ordinance allows for the trapping, neutering, vaccination and ear-tipping of community cats. Following this process, they will be returned to the area where they were trapped. This Ordinance serves as a means of controlling the feral cat population and providing for the safety of feral cats and the community at large. This ordinance was passed on March 6, 2018 after its second reading.



Notice in the photo *(left)* the tipping of the left ear. This is the sign of a cared for feral cat that has been spayed or neutered and vaccinated. Do not take to the pound, they have already been trapped and belong to a feral cat colony. The best help to give these cats is an outdoor shelter and food and water.

Volunteers Needed for Bike Share Program

Camden County currently has a county-wide Bike Share Program. *County Bike Share* has a depository at Lakeland where volunteers refurbish and then send out to municipalities that want to start their own bike share programs. They are working with Gloucester Township to start one in May. Mayor Kappatos and Council have been considering a bike share but volunteers are needed to begin the program. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

HOW DO I REPORT A SEWER EMERGENCY?

If you are experiencing a sewer emergency please call County Dispatch at 856-939-3354. Homeowner is responsible to know location of clean out and maintain access. The lateral lid and/ or plug must be intact to prevent debris and rain water from entering the system.

WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IS THE CURBSIDE TREE?

All trees, and debris from removal of trees located on the property of the homeowner up to an including the curb, are the responsibility of the homeowner.

MY TRASH WAS MISSED OR TRASH COLLECTION QUESTIONS

HOW DO I DISPOSE OF AN APPLIANCE?

Have your vendor remove it when the new item is delivered. The Borough does not collect appliances containing Freon.

HOW DO I DISPOSE OF METAL AND ELECTRONICS?

Place the items at the curb and call 856-939-5161 x1001/1002

HOW DO I DISPOSE OF MOTOR OIL?

Oil is collected at the Public Works garage. Please call 856-939-5161 x1001/1002 and schedule a drop off time during normal business hours.

HOW DO I REPORT A WATER LEAK OR RUSTY WATER?

Contact New Jersey American Water at 1-800-272-1325

HOW DO I DISPOSE OF PAINT?

Latex and oil based paint needs to be dried by filling container with kitty litter and placing in household trash. Public Works does not collect.

WHAT DO I DO WITH MY YARD WASTE, BRANCHES OR LEAVES?

Grass, branches and leaves may be placed in a can or paper bag (NO plastic bags) and placed at the curb for pick up on Mondays, year round. Large branches or trees must be cut into sections no longer than 4 feet and stacked at the curb for the chipper. Please call 856-939-5161 x1001/1002 to advise chipper will be needed. Leaves are collected in piles at the curb in November and December. No piles may be within 10 feet of any storm inlet. If you hire a landscaper or tree service, all debris but be removed by them. The only exception is leaf and yard waste. Do not place dirt or stumps in cans or bags for collection; the Borough does not accept it.
