## PUBLIC SAFETY



"As Public Safety Director I wear many hats. Under my direction are the Police Department, the Fire Department, the Office of Emergency Management, Municipal Alliance and the LEAD (Law Enforcement Against Drugs) Program. My emphasis during my tenure has been Community Outreach. I encourage all the departments under me to seek ways to be involved in the community. LEAD, Fire Prevention Week, National Night Out, Prescription Drug Drop Box and the Police Bike Patrol, are just some of the ways we are working to accomplish this."

#### **Emergency Shelter Information**

When temperatures drop below freezing, and conditions pose a threat to individuals who are homeless or medically fragile, a network of agencies throughout New Jersey help people obtain shelter, food, and clothing. During times such as these, county or municipal government will often initiate a Code Blue Alert, which enables authorities to take homeless adults to shelter programs that have agreed to make additional beds available. Warming Centers are also opened during stated hours to provide residents with a place to escape the harsh winter conditions. There is a Warming Center here in Runnemede at the Municipal Building if a Code Blue is initialized. It will operate from 7:30pm to 7:30am any day of the week. Runnemede Borough Code Blue Assistance Hot Line 856-498-7931 or call the Runnemede Police Department. The same also applies to excessively hot weather where a Code Red will be initialized. The shelter will then operate from 7:30am to 7:30pm.

## NEW FIRE COMPANY APPARATUS

Your tax dollars at work! Meet the newest addition to the Fire Company, the 2019 Fire Engine. Here she is making a pit stop at Lambeau Field on her way to her new home. This engine is replacing the older 1992 engine, who's career has not yet ended. It has been entered into a shared services program with Bellmawr, Barrington, and Haddon Heights as a back up engine in times of need.



## BIG SURPRISE FOR JUNIOR POLICE ACADEMY

In addition to the L.E.A.D. program, our Borough offers a Junior Police Academy for one week in the month of August. The highlight this past year was the arrival of our State Trooper helicopter to educate participants on it's capabilities. #### Updates from the Fire Company and EMS

- Firefighters were trained with sixteen newly purchased Emergency Escape Systems. These systems allow the firefighter to escape and descend from a window in an emergency. The system has rope and a device which lets the firefighter descend from the window above ground level at a rate that will not cause injury to the firefighter.
- Emergency Medical Services continues to be very busy. Please ensure your house numbers can be visible from the street. This assists the crew in locating your home.
- The Fire Company is always looking for dedicated and committed people to become members. Becoming a volunteer is a rewarding way to give back to the community and become part of a great tradition of service. Free training is provided.

#### Sewer Repair


Runnemede Public Works is always at the ready for unexpected sewer line problems. They are prepared to handle sudden emergencies as seen in the photo below where a sewer line collapsed. If not addressed quickly, such damage could cause sewer back up into residents' homes. Public Works is on call for emergencies at 856-939-3354. Additionally, sewer repairs in Runnemede are handled in-house by the Borough Public Works employees, not contracted to another company, saving tax payer dollars. These dedicated employees are keeping Runnemede flushing and flowing properly.



### WHAT GOES AROUND COMES AROUND

Mayor and Council would like to bring to the attention of residents the potentially harmful impacts of storm water contamination. Any substance in your yard, from vehicle fluids to pesticides, will be washed into the storm water system with rain. This water is drained into lakes and ponds which endangers wildlife and contaminates the soil. Please be mindful and keep your yard free of contaminants. In

addition, gutter down spouts and sump pumps must be aimed into the grass and not into the street. This will prevent any excessive strain on the drainage system & pumping station, saving energy.

#### The Municipal Building is Open for Business!

This past fall, Mayor and Council, along with special guests Freeholders President Lou Cappelli and Camden County Assemblyman Bill Moen, held the ribbon cutting ceremony for the municipal building. Months of construction and years of planning finally came to fruition. The municipal building now features full ADA compliance along with new meeting rooms, new department entrances, and a new reception area.



Also a major part of this project was the addition of the front parking lot. This new lot is not only available for borough business, but also general public parking anytime of the day. Mayor and Council are working to address the concerns of residents, and hope that providing these parking spaces will create more ease of access to the Black Horse Pike business corridor.

#### The Drop Box

Residents are able to make payments after hours using the drop box located at the new entrance to the municipal building. Payments for taxes, sewer, licensing and court fees can be dropped off here.



#### Adding New Sidewalks

The Borough has recently constructed two new sidewalks to sections of Davis Rd and Clements Bridge Rd. This will create a more safe environment for the community's children as they frequently walk these routes to school.





### COMPLETED REPAIRS TO CHARLES AVE

Every year, the Borough budgets the cost of full repairs for at least two streets in town. This sets aside funds for improvements to curbs, pavement, drainage, etc. This past year work was completed to a total of four streets, Philips Ave, Shissler Circle, Charles Ave, and South Reed. Long standing issues were addressed, such as the drainage problems on (below pictured street). This vital infrastructure budget part allows Runnemede to stay updated and safe.



## A TRIBUTE FIT FOR A HERO

The following in an excerpt from the Courier Post Online: [Anna, a gentle German shepherd, was a favorite visitor at the Barrington Senior Center, recalled Sue Sanders. Sanders of Runnemede, who organized activities at the center, would always make it a point to pet Anna during her frequent stops. Anna was a certified therapy dog but also was trained in search and rescue. It was in that role that she and her owner-handler, Sarah Atlas, were deployed to New York with New Jersey Task Force One on Sept. 11, 2001. Within months of the assignment, Anna became ill and retired from service. In 2002, she had to be put down. Sanders, an amateur artist and quilter, seized an opportunity to honor Anna when she heard a New York fabric artist was gathering 9/11 tribute quilts. "Can I do a memorial quilt about a dog?" Sanders asked. The answer was yes, and Sanders created and shipped off a 3-by-6-foot quilt dedicated to Anna. The artwork became part of the 9/11 Memorial Museum's permanent collection when it opened in 2014. Now it's highlighted in a special exhibit at the museum in New York City called "Dogs of 9/11," which opened in late July and will run through fall 2019.]



## MAKING STRIDES TO REVITALIZE

The Black Horse Pike Business Corridor as long been a sensitive topic of discussion among residents and businesses. Most often, the conversations revolve around the desolate appearance of empty buildings and closed businesses. This seems to stand in contrast to the high traffic of vehicles and pedestrians. One might ask how such a highly traveled area can lack in the necessary building blocks for a successful local economy. Mayor and Council for years have been taking notice, and are actively working to help kick-start the business corridor community. There are new plans for a redevelopment and the future is looking bright.

Mayor and Council are forming a partnership with local artist Ken Leap to form the Runnemede Art Committee. Ken Leap, who recently opened The Painted Window stained-glass studio on the Black Horse Pike, has become increasingly active in the community. He has recognized the need for a revitalization and formed the group Reimagine Runnemede.

Ken Leap has a rich family history with Runnemede. His grandfather, Jack Leap, was a prominent public figure in town. He opened a grocery store on the corner of 2nd Ave and the Black Horse Pike in 1946. This location is now occupied by Mark Antony's Hair Cuts and the Polish-American Deli. Jack was highly involved with town affairs and started a number of other business and community groups. Following Jack's lead was Ken's father, Bill Leap. Bill also worked at the grocery store with his father Jack. Later, he ran his sign business in Runnemede for 26 years. He, too, held offices and maintained membership in a number of community groups and committees. Bill even wrote a book, *The History of Runnemede 1926-1976*.

Together, there is new enthusiasm in Runnemede. Mayor and Council have already been working on new redevelopment plans. Incentives like tax abatement programs and updated ordinances are just a couple of the tools being used to attract more businesses and investors to the area. Stay tuned for updates on this movement and read more about Ken's vision for Runnemede on page 11.

## Improving Residents' Quality of Life

The Borough of Runnemede has made changes to its ordinances so it will be easier for residents who wish to make home improvements. Residents can now accomplish the following projects without applying for a permit:

- Increase the size of detached garages/sheds
- Make changes to home siding
- Make changes to home roofing

Planning and Zoning is accepting feedback from residents regarding other ordinances they may feel are unfair or unregulated. Any residents who would like to give input are welcome to attend the planning board meetings, held the second Wednesday of every month.

If you have been summoned to appear in the Borough Court room, the meeting time has now changed to 2pm.

## Redevelopment of the Black Horse Pike

The meetings have been attended and the plans have been approved by both the county and the state. Now it is time for the Borough to roll up its sleeves and improve the Black Horse Pike business corridor. Borough employees have been working hard with engineers and planners to get the redevelopment program of main street approved. Stay tuned for more developments.

## The Master Plan

Every 7-10 years the borough is required to revise it's master plan, which includes mapping the streets and updating ordinances. The Borough is working diligently to make all the necessary adjustments this year. This update will be designed to aid in the revitalization projects by making it easier for businesses and merchants to flourish.

## NEW DRIVE-THRU AT DUNKIN'



It may not be known to residents, but Runnemede ordinances did not permit drive-thru lanes at businesses in town for over 50 years. Recent changes to the ordinances have abolished this restriction. Dunkin' Donuts is now the first business in over five decades to have a drive-thru in Runnemede.

## CONGRATULATIONS KANDY KLEHAMER

Planning Board Chairman Kandy Klehamer was recognized last year by the Camden County Federation of Democratic Women as a "Woman of Honor". She received this award for

### From Flooding to Flowers Introducing the Rain Garden

The Borough is working in coordination with the Green Team for the installation of a rain garden. This garden will be planted on the field at Green Acres. The field is on an incline, which results in heavy ponding and saturation after heavy rain. Currently, this ponding lingers in the field and renders the area unusable. The garden will help soak up the water and keep the field dry. The Borough hopes that this will then make the field more user friendly and inviting. Not only do rain gardens help desaturate the soil, but they also provide a home for small birds, butterflies and other pollinating creatures. The native plants in the garden also help filter out pollutants from the water run-off. Rain gardens are low maintenance as the native plants do not require special care, unlike exotics plants you may find in home gardens. The plants and flowers are also perennials so they will grow back each year without the need for replanting.

## REIMAGINE RUNNEMEDE



Reimagine Runnemede is a new committee, formed under the leadership of Ken Leap, of Leap Studio. It consists of 12 core members whose goal is to spark community participation in a public arts program. Consistent with the Borough's redevelopment project for the Black Horse Pike, we aim to make our town more economically and aesthetically vibrant through the addition of murals and wind sculptures, constructed and painted by the residents.

We have a support network that includes our Mayor and Councilmen, The Green Team, The Women's Club, Triton Regional High School, local businesses, and local photographers and artists.

Reimagine Runnemede has applied for a grant to fund training in mural arts for willing volunteers. Through a collective, sustained effort, we can improve our business sector and our community spirit. By 2026 - our 100th Centennial year - we envision completion of a transformation that makes us all proud to say we live in Runnemede!

# DID YOU KNOW?

## PROTECTING THE COMMUNITY'S YOUTH

As seen in recent news, the potential threat to our children's safety at school is very real. There has been much media coverage of school shootings, which causes great concern for parents and school administration. The Borough and the police department is now working with our schools by providing year-round security to protect our greatest asset, our children. They have committed one police officer to a full time watch rotation. Officer Brooks will be present on a daily basis at Bingham, Downing, and Volz schools.

If you see something, say something. Report any suspicious activity to the school faculty, administration, or police department.

### Freeholders' Awards

Every year, the Camden County Freeholders award a select few of Runnemede's notable residents with a congratulatory proclamation. This year, the recipient of the January Young Leader Award was Steve McPherson. Steve (pictured, top) was recognized for his outstanding achievement as he recently

obtained the rank of Eagle Scout. It is fairly difficult to achieve this, which explains why only 4% of boys who join Scouting attain this rank. Qualifying Scouts need to earn 21 merit badges, 13 of which are required for Eagle; a minimum of 6 months as a Life Scout; and to have completed a leadership community service project.

Another award recipient was Rachelle Omenson, a teacher at Triton High School and an involved member of the Runnemede Green Team. Rachelle (pictured, middle) was recognized for her dedicated and outstanding work as a member of the Green Team. She is also a founding member of the Runnemede Art Committee and Reimagine Runnemede. Robert Delsordo (pictured, bottom) was presented Camden County's Community Involvement Award. 



K-9 Wolf... badge #23 was a long-haired German Sheppard and was born in Germany. Wolf was brought to the United States in 2005 and served until 2011. Wolf was trained as a Patrol K-9 and a Narcotics K-9."
