MAJOR DEVELOPMENT — Any development that provides for ultimately disturbing more than 5,000 square feet of land or 5,000 square feet of impervious coverage. This rule also applies to redevelopment and infill projects. At the discretion of the Runnemede Planning Board or Zoning Board of Adjustment, whichever is applicable, and on a case-by-case basis, stormwater management for major development projects can be waived to meet the minimum stormwater control requirements as defined in the Stormwater Rule (N.J.A.C. 7:8) due to site-specific hardships, and that it can be demonstrated that such a waiver would still provide for the protection of local water quality. Projects that qualify from this requirement are as follows: 1) development that provides for ultimately disturbing land from 5,000 square feet to one acre; and 2) development that provides for ultimately increasing impervious coverage from 5,000 square feet to 1/4 acre. Otherwise, compensatory stormwater mitigation measures for noncompliant projects will required in accordance with N.J.A.C. 7:8.
